

A Dangerous Mission

At the end of 1941, the United States entered World War II after Japan bombed the U.S. Navy's fleet at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. Soon after, the U.S. Office of Strategic Services (OSS) asked Berg to take their oath of secrecy and come work for them. The OSS was the first government spy agency in the United States. It would later become the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). In 1944, the OSS sent Berg on the most dangerous of missions.

Heisenberg spoke, but the gun stayed in Berg's pocket. Nothing the American heard made him believe Germany had developed a bomb.

But Berg needed to be certain. One night, he wormed his way to Heisenberg's dinner table and sat down. After dinner, the two went outside into the dark night. Berg peppered Heisenberg with questions and was satisfied that Germany would not develop an atomic weapon anytime soon. 


A Day in the Life of a Fisher

Terra Cotta Soldiers


